- 19 renewed since February of 2020. Currently the number is 47,000
- 20 who have not renewed, they are certificate or license. You have
- 21 until August 15th to renew online. So, please, it's a critical

- 1 point. I ask you to, one, be patient because that is a huge
- 2 volume of individuals that we have to renew. I have been
- 3 working with the Medical Hospital Association as well as HFAM
- 4 and Life Span to get the word out for the renewals. I've also
- 5 been working with HR so that they can send us a list and we can
- 6 work from that list for those who have already submitted their
- 7 applications just to make sure that everyone gets through. So,
- 8 please, do not wait until August 15th to renew. Please renew
- 9 now so that we can get you up and ready to go because the
- 10 extension for the licenses, again, is only till August 15th.
- 11 So, I appreciate your help in this, and that's all I have at
- 12 this point.
- 13 MR. RAYMOND: All right. Thank you, Karen. I
- 14 appreciate that update. We will table Review of Open Session
- 15 Minute for Approval. We will move to Approval of Consent
- 16 Agenda.
- MS. GREEN: Good morning, this is Dr. Sheila Green.
- 18 I just need to say that you sound a little garbled. We can
- 19 hardly understand what you're saying. Thank you.
- 20 MR. RAYMOND: Okay. We will try to speak up. Thank
- 21 you for that. Let's move to Initial Certified Nursing Assistant

- 1 Training Programs Seeking Board Approval.
- 2 MS. EVANS: Joyce?

- 15 through .07. The facility is approved by OHCQ and they also
- 16 have MHEC approval to train their own employees.

- 20 only training their own staff members for CNAs only.

- 11 MS. POLK: Second, Polk.
- MR. RAYMOND: Motion from Hill, second from Polk.
- 13 All those in favor?
- 14 ALL: Aye.
- MR. RAYMOND: Any opposed?
- 16 (No oppositions)
- 17 MR. RAYMOND: Motion carries.
- 18 MS. EVANS: The next instructor for approval is Chay
- 19 Crosser from Western Maryland Regional Dialysis Center. Ms.
- 20 Crosser has met all of the requirements under 10.39.02.05. The
- 21 Practice and Education Committee is requesting approval for Ms.

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1 Crosser.
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- 2 MS. STEELE: Motion to accept, Steele.
- 3 MS. POLK: Second, Polk.
- 4 MR. RAYMOND: Motion from Steele, second from Polk.
- 5 All those in favor?
- 6 ALL: Aye.
- 7 MR. RAYMOND: Any opposed?
- 8 (No oppositions)
- 9 MR. RAYMOND: Motion carries.
- 10 MS. EVANS: The last person is Earnest Santmyire
- 11 from Western Maryland Regional Dialysis Center. Mr. Santmyire
- 12 has met all of the requirements under 10.39.02.05. The Practice
- 13 and Education Committee is seeking approval from the Board.
- MS. JACQUELINE HILL: Motion for approval, Hill.
- MS. STEELE: Second, Steele.
- MR. RAYMOND: I have a motion from Hill, second from
- 17 Steele. All those in favor?
- 18 ALL: Aye.
- MR. RAYMOND: Any opposed?
- 20 (No oppositions)
- 21 MR. RAYMOND: Motion carries. That concludes the

- 1 approvals for those faculty members.
- 2 MS. EVANS: Yes.
- 3 MR. RAYMOND: That concludes that section of our
- 4 agenda.
- 5 We will move to Education. Dr. Green, are you
- 6 online?
- 7 MS. GREEN: Good morning. This is Dr. Sheila Green,
- 8 and I'm here this morning on behalf of the Education Department
- 9 as an education consultant that provides the Board with three
- 10 reports today.
- 11 The first one is 4A, Hosanna College of Health, Inc.
- 12 formerly of Miramar, Florida. It has been identified for the
- 13 Board's consideration that it is not a substantially equivalent
- 14 program. The issue with this particular program is that it was
- 15 closed in July of 2019. The former director, Ms. Marie
- 16 Gonzales, was supposed to have provided as part of the
- 17 application information to determine substantial equivalency.
- 18 We initiated that review, and also the follow-up with that and
- 19 initiated a cover memo. I contacted Dr. Sherry Sutton-Johnson
- 20 who's the director of education for the Florida Board of Nursing
- 21 regarding this program. It was found that the program was

- 1 terminated by the Florida Board of Nursing because the program
- 2 failed to obtain accreditation by the July 1, 2019 deadline in
- 3 accordance with their code standards, Section 464.019(11) of
- 4 Florida Statute.
- 5 And so, the information that you have in your packet
- 6 indicates that this Hosanna College of Health, Inc. formerly
- 7 located in Miramar, Florida with an associate degree RN program
- 8 did not meet our COMAR 10.27.03.02 to .15(a) standards. It did
- 9 not meet our Nurse Practice Act requirements under Article Title
- 10 8, Nursing; Subtitle 2, Maryland State Board of Nursing and
- 11 qualifications related to applicants and their educational
- 12 experience. And it also did not meet COMAR 10.27.01(c) under
- 13 the definition of substantially equivalent.
- 14 This program was reviewed by the Practice and
- 15 Education Committee on June 11, 2021. It was recommended that
- 16 the program was not eligible for
- 17 out-of-state approval by the State of Maryland. It is now
- 18 advanced to the Board for your consideration in the fact that it
- 19 does not meet substantial equivalency requirements. It was, as
- 20 I said, reviewed by the Practice and Education Committee on June
- 21 11th. All the supporting documents that are attached give you,

- 1 first of all, on the second page gives you the review of the
- 2 COMAR and the Code of Annotated Health Occupation requirements
- 3 for this program. Please note, particularly under the nursing
- 4 program administrator, 10.27.03.07(a)(d), that Ms. Gonzales is a
- 5 Florida single-state licensed only, and that does meet
- 6 Maryland's regulatory requirements. And a host of the other
- 7 considerations for each of the COMAR standards under 10.27.03
- 8 are included in the packet along with my contact information for
- 9 Dr. Sherry Sutton-Johnson of the Florida Board of Nursing. My
- 10 handwritten notes regarding the program, it's determined that it
- 11 did not meet substantial equivalency. I included catalogs for
- 12 your reference. Although it is an overview of the program, it
- 13 does not give us additional information.
- 14 Our request at this point to the Board is to accept
- 15 the recommendation approved by the Practice and Education
- 16 Committee that the Hosanna College of Health, Inc. associate
- 17 degree of nursing program does not meet substantial equivalency
- 18 requirements, and they are not eligible for out-of-state
- 19 approval by the State of Maryland.
- I will answer any questions that the board members
- 21 may have. Thank you.

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1 MR. RAYMOND: Any questions from board members?
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- 2 (No questions posed)
- 3 MR. RAYMOND: We are seeking a motion from board
- 4 members acknowledging that the Hosanna College of Health program
- 5 from Miramar, Florida does not meet our minimum requirements for
- 6 equivalent nursing programs.
- 7 MS. STEELE: Motion to approve the recommendation
- 8 that they are not eligible for
- 9 out-of-state approval from Maryland, Steele.
- 10 MR. RAYMOND: Steele.
- MS. HAYWARD: Second, Hayward.
- MR. RAYMOND: I have a motion from Steele, second
- 13 from Hayward. All those in favor of the motion?
- 14 ALL: Aye.
- MR. RAYMOND: Any opposed?
- 16 (No oppositions)
- 17 MR. RAYMOND: Motion carries.
- MS. GREEN: The next program for presentation to the
- 19 Board is Mountain State University. This is an out-of-state
- 20 program located in West Virginia. It was closed in August of
- 21 2012. It was necessary to obtain information from the Board of

- 1 Nursing in West Virginia regarding this program. Dr. Robin
- 2 Lewis, the director of Practice and Education for that Board was
- 3 contacted, and provided a wealth of information regarding the
- 4 program. The State of West Virginia requires all nursing
- 5 programs to obtain and maintain Board recognized nursing
- 6 accreditation to continue operations in that state. Mountain
- 7 State University nursing education program lost its
- 8 accreditation through the National League for Nursing
- 9 Accrediting Commission, Inc. It was formerly known as NLNAC,
- 10 this occurred in March, 2011.
- Just for the Board, additional information, NLNAC is
- 12 now ACEN. It used to be NLNAC, so this is a historical part of
- 13 the National League for Nursing in terms of its former
- 14 accrediting on the Board. This also occurred with the
- 15 establishing of the ACEN. That's only for your information.
- 16 The attached findings were presented to the
- 17 Practice and Education Committee on June 11, 2021, and now it's
- 18 provided for the Board's consideration. Please note that the
- 19 packet that you have has the inclusion of the criteria, review
- 20 of the email provided through Dr. Robin Lewis of the West
- 21 Virginia Board of Nursing, and the findings from NLNAC and the

- 1 decision for Mountain State's closure. The program does not
- 2 meet our regulatory requirement 10.27.03.02 through .15(a). The
- 3 program does not meet our Nurse Practice Act under Health
- 4 Occupations Article Title 8 under Nurses, particularly meeting
- 5 qualifications of applicants' education for registered nurses
- 6 and licensed practical nurses, and it does not meet substantial
- 7 equivalency requirements as required under COMAR 10.27.01(c).
- 8 This program was reviewed and the recommendation was brought
- 9 forward to Practice and Education Committee for the Board's
- 10 final review and decision that this is not a substantially
- 11 equivalent program.
- 12 I would like to bring to the Board's attention on
- 13 Page 2 under the review of our COMAR standards that there were
- 14 considerable concerns with regards to the faculty government
- 15 under 10.27.03.05 and its inability to participate because there
- 16 were multiple locations. This is an unfortunate situation where
- 17 it seems this sort of program was growing very quickly, and
- 18 various regions along the state that did not have the
- 19 fortification it needed in order to anchor itself as it was
- 20 growing. The nurse administrator had insufficient assistance in
- 21 being able to meet her role requirements because of the

- 1 increased demand that was happening so quickly. It was
- 2 determined that faculty did not have the minimum master's degree
- 3 in the nursing program, which also had ramifications on student
- 4 learning and development. There were inadequate numbers of
- 5 faculty. There were inconsistencies and inadequacies in the
- 6 curriculum pathways because of the loose standardization as a
- 7 campus that it was not able to occur.
- 8 So, I share this information with you. You have the
- 9 corroborated information related to what NLNAC findings were
- 10 along with the letter indicating when the program lost its
- 11 accreditation, and when the Board of Nursing for West Virginia
- 12 determined the need for closure. Our findings are really that
- 13 Mountain State University's nursing education program, which was
- 14 a baccalaureate program, closed program since the 2011 time
- 15 period 2012, I'm sorry. It does not meet out requirements for
- 16 out-of-state approval by the State of Maryland. And our request
- 17 is that the Board accepts the recommendation approved by the
- 18 Practice and Education Committee regarding this program that it
- 19 is not substantially equivalent. Thank you.
- 20 MR. RAYMOND: All right. Thank you, Dr. Green. Any
- 21 questions from board members about Mountain State University's

- 1 eligibility?
- 2 (No questions posed)
- 3 MR. RAYMOND: Hearing no questions. I will
- 4 entertain a motion to acknowledge and approve the recommendation
- 5 that Mountain State University does not substantially meet the
- 6 equivalent nursing education program for out-of-state approval
- 7 in Maryland.
- 8 MS. STEELE: So moved, Steele.
- 9 MS. HAYWARD: Second, Hayward.
- 10 MR. RAYMOND: I have a motion from Steele, a second
- 11 from Hayward. All those in favor?
- 12 ALL: Aye.
- MR. RAYMOND: Any opposed?
- 14 (No oppositions)
- MR. RAYMOND: Motion carries.
- 16 MS. GREEN: Thank you. The final presentation from
- 17 the Education Department is 4C. This is regarding the
- 18 University of Maryland School of Nursing. They have submitted
- 19 eight post-doctoral advanced practice registered nurse
- 20 certificate program application.
- 21 I would like to acknowledge Dr. Jane Kirschling, Dr.

- 1 Isaac is on the line, and Mrs. Hines from the University of
- 2 Maryland.
- 3 MS. ISAAC: Yes, this is Shannon Isaac, and I
- 4 believe my colleagues, Angie Hines and Ann Mech, are also on.
- 5 MS. GREEN: Thank you so very much, and thank you
- 6 for joining us. The documents that are identified on the
- 7 memorandum, the University of Maryland submitted eight
- 8 post-doctoral advanced practice registered nurse certificate
- 9 program applications to the Board in May of 2021 for review and
- 10 approval determination, and the applications reference the
- 11 following advanced practice programs as a post-doctoral level.
- 12 These are programs whereby an individual has applied to the
- 13 University of Maryland to become an advanced practice registered
- 14 nurse. These individuals are coming already with their
- 15 doctorate degrees. So, they may have a doctorate in nursing
- 16 practice, they may have a doctorate of philosophy, they even may
- 17 have a doctorate in education and that they have chosen to come
- 18 back and become a PRN. That is why we are looking at these
- 19 programs. They are already approved as it relates to existing
- 20 programs that University of Maryland already offers, but they
- 21 are bringing this to the Board's attention through their

- 1 application so the post-doctoral advanced practice registered
- 2 nurse's certificate program application. So, adult
- 3 gerontological acute care nurse practitioner; also, adult
- 4 gerontological clinical nurse specialist; adult gerontological
- 5 primary care practitioner; nurse of anesthesia; nurse
- 6 anesthetist; family nurse practitioner; neonatal nurse
- 7 practitioner; pediatric acute care nurse practitioner; pediatric
- 8 primary care nurse practitioner; psychiatric mental health nurse
- 9 practitioner, and also family as well. They have provided the
- 10 team at University of Maryland School of Nursing. They've
- 11 already provided all of the requested supporting documents
- 12 including information and approvals from Maryland Higher
- 13 Education Committee for their programs when they occurred. We
- 14 have those on file now for the Board. Middle State Commission,
- 15 because this would also require a substantial change
- 16 notification to the Commission as well as CCNE that would have
- 17 included substantial change notification and approval letters,
- 18 and they have provided all of these as well as the letters of
- 19 support and approval from Dr. Jay Perman, who was at that time
- 20 the president of UMB, and is currently the chancellor for the
- 21 University System of Maryland, as well as the supporting letters

- 1 from and approvals from former chancellor, now chancellor
- 2 emeritus Dr. Robert Caret, retired.
- 3 We found that these documents met all of the COMAR
- 4 requirements that are in 10.27.07.06, Definition of the Nurse
- 5 Practitioner Education, the Practice of a Nurse Anesthetist
- 6 under COMAR 10.27.06 as well as the Practice of a Clinical Nurse
- 7 Specialist under COMAR 10.27.27.
- 8 The recommendation was brought forward to Practice
- 9 and Education Committee and approved on June 11, 2021. We are
- 10 requesting that we recommend that the Practice and Education
- 11 Committee to recommend to the Board that the eight submitted
- 12 post-doctoral advanced practice registered nurse certificate
- 13 program applications be approved in accordance with our
- 14 regulatory requirements. And now, we are advancing this
- 15 recommendation to the Board to accept the recommendation of
- 16 approval that was given by the Practice and Education Committee
- 17 regarding these post-doctoral advanced practice registered nurse
- 18 certificate program applications. So, and please note the
- 19 criteria that were reviewed and met and are included in your
- 20 document as well as the cover information letter that was
- 21 provided by Dr. Isaac regarding the supporting documents that we

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1 now have on file here at the Board. We request that the
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- 2 applications be given approval to the Board. Thank you.
- 3 If there are any questions, I would be happy to
- 4 entertain them, as well our representatives from the University
- 5 of Maryland that are currently with us at this meeting. Thank
- 6 you.
- 7 MR. RAYMOND: Thank you, Dr. Isaac or, Dr. Green.
- 8 Are there any questions from the board members?
- 9 (No questions posed)
- 10 MR. RAYMOND: Dr. Isaac, thank you for joining us
- 11 this morning. Is there anything that you would like to share
- 12 with the board members before we ask for a motion and vote?
- MS. ISAAC: No, sir. Thank you, Dr. Raymond. I
- 14 think Dr. Green covered everything. We are excited to offer
- 15 this opportunity to the citizens of Maryland and the residents
- 16 of Maryland.
- 17 MR. RAYMOND: Thank you, Dr. Isaac. Having no
- 18 questions, I will entertain a motion to accept the
- 19 recommendation to approve the programs for post-doctoral APRN
- 20 certification program.
- 21 MS. STEELE: So moved, Steele.

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1 MR. RAYMOND: Motion from Steele.
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- 2 MS. POLK: Second, Polk.
- 3 MR. RAYMOND: Second from Polk. All those in favor?
- 4 ALL: Aye.
- 5 MR. RAYMOND: Any opposed?
- 6 (No oppositions)
- 7 MR. RAYMOND: Motion carries.
- 8 MS. GREEN: Thank you.
- 9 MR. RAYMOND: Thank you.
- 10 MS. ISAAC: Thank you all.
- MR. RAYMOND: We have nothing from Practice, right?
- MS. CONTI: I don't believe so.
- MR. RAYMOND: Nothing from Practice, right?
- 14 MS. EVANS: Right.
- MR. RAYMOND: So, we will do Certification, monthly
- 16 statistics. Jaray, are you online?
- MS. RICHARDSON: Good morning, yes. Yes, I am here.
- 18 Good morning.
- 19 ALL: Good morning.
- 20 MS. RICHARDSON: Are numbers for May are: The CNA -
- 21 I'm sorry, the certified nursing assistant total number is

1 201,574; active, 70,470. Geriatric nursing assistant, 86,941;

- 2 active, 31,435. Certified medicine aides, 4,880; active, 1,519.
- 3 Home health aides, 549; active, 41. Dialysis technicians,
- 4 3,685; active, 1,997. Medication technicians, 178,074; active,
- 5 53,118. School health aides, 1,101; active, 365. Endorsement
- 6 applicants average per week are 10 to 15.
- 7 MR. RAYMOND: Thank you, Jaray. Any questions for
- 8 Jaray from board members?
- 9 (No questions posed)
- 10 MR. RAYMOND: All right. Thank you for that report.

- MS. RICHARDSON: Thank you.
- 13 MR. RAYMOND: We will move to Licensure and Advanced
- 14 Practice. Shetarah?
- MS. GOODWIN: Good morning. I am going to provide
- 16 the monthly statistics for May of 2021. For registered nurse by
- 17 exam we have 93; registered nurse by endorsement, 298. Licensed
- 18 practical nurse by exam, 20; licensed practical nurse by
- 19 endorsement, 18. Temporary registered nurse, 150; temporary
- 20 licensed practical nurse, 12. Advanced compact, AC, 42;
- 21 advanced practice nurses in all categories, 122. Total advanced

- 1 practice registered nurses, APRN, 164. Forensic nurse
- 2 examiners, 3. Worker's Compensation medical case managers, 2.
- For renewals we have registered nurses, 4,312;
- 4 licensed practical nurse, 543. Advanced compact, AC, 30.
- 5 Advanced practice nurse in all categories, 364. Total advanced
- 6 practice registered nurses, APRN, 394. Forensic nurse
- 7 examiners, 3. Worker's Compensation medical case managers, 10.
- 8 Any questions?
- 9 MR. RAYMOND: Any questions from board members?
- 10 (No questions posed)
- 11 MR. RAYMOND: Thank you, Shetarah.
- MS. GOODWIN: All right, thank you.
- MR. RAYMOND: We will move to Legislative Affairs.
- 14 Iman?
- MS. FARID: Yes, good morning. I am here, can you
- 16 hear me?
- MR. RAYMOND: We can hear you just fine, thank you.
- 18 MS. FARID: Thank you. So, today I will be
- 19 presenting Item 8A. The following bills were enacted on May 30,
- 20 2021 under Article II, Section 17(c) of the Maryland
- 21 Constitution. This section states that any bill presented to

- 1 the governor within six days prior to adjournment of any session
- 2 of the General Assembly or after such adjournment shall become
- 3 law without the governor's signature unless it is vetoed by the
- 4 governor within thirty days after its presentation.
- 5 First, we'll start with House Bill 14, titled,
- 6 Pharmacists Prescription Drug and Device Labels Expiration
- 7 Dates. This bill provides further clarification on the
- 8 expiration date on drugs and devices dispensed in the
- 9 manufacturers' original packaging. It was enacted in Chapter
- 10 489. The Board took no position on this bill.
- 11 House Bill 28, cross-filed with Senate Bill 5,
- 12 titled, Public Health Implicit Bias Training and the Office of
- 13 Minority Health and Health Disparities. This bill requires a
- 14 healthcare professional, as a condition of renewal, to take an
- 15 implicit bias training program. It was enacted in Chapters 744
- 16 and 745. The Board took no position.
- 17 House Bill 78, cross-filed with Senate Bill 52,
- 18 titled, Public Health Maryland Commission on Health Equity,
- 19 also known as The Shirley Nathan Pulliam Health Equity Act of
- 20 2021. This bill establishes the Maryland Commission on Health
- 21 Equity to address and improve health outcomes and reduce health

- 1 inequities in the State. It was enacted in Chapters 749 and
- 2 750. The Board took no position.
- 3 House Bill 95, cross-filed with Senate Bill 476,
- 4 titled, Health Occupations Nurses Delegation of Tasks. This
- 5 bill allows an advanced practice nurse to delegate nursing or
- 6 other technical tasks to an assistant. It was enacted in
- 7 Chapters 753 and 754. The Board submitted a letter of support.
- 8 House Bill 107, cross-filed with Senate Bill 499,
- 9 titled, Prohibition on Vending Machine Sales of Drugs and
- 10 Medicines Repeal. This bill permits the sale, distribution, or
- 11 disposal of drugs, medicines, pharmaceutical preparations, and
- 12 medical preparations by means of a vending machine or similar
- 13 device. It was enacted in Chapters 496 and 497. The Board took
- 14 no position.
- 15 House Bill 132, cross-filed with Senate Bill 41,
- 16 titled, Health Mental and Emotional Disorders Consent, also
- 17 known as the Mental Health Access Initiative. This bill allows
- 18 a minor, as young as 12 years old, to consent to the
- 19 consultation, diagnosis, and treatment of a mental or emotional
- 20 disorder. It was enacted in Chapter 743. The Board has
- 21 submitted a letter of opposition.

- 1 House Bill 135, cross-filed with Senate Bill 84,
- 2 titled, Pharmacists Administration of
- 3 Self-Administered Medications and Maintenance Injectable
- 4 Medications. This bill authorizes a pharmacist to administer a
- 5 maintenance injectable medication to a patient. It was enacted
- 6 in Chapters 757 and 758. The Board took no position.
- 7 House Bill 183, cross-filed with Senate Bill 449,
- 8 titled, Public Information Act Revisions, also known as
- 9 Equitable Access to Records Act. This bill requires an official
- 10 custodian to proactively disclose public records upon request.
- 11 It requires an official custodian to publish on the website of a
- 12 governmental unit, a report on the requests received for
- 13 inspection of public records. It additionally expands the
- 14 authority of the Public Information Act Compliance Board to
- 15 resolve disputes between an applicant and an official custodian.
- 16 It was enacted in Chapter 658. The Board has submitted a
- 17 letter of concern.
- 18 House Bill 309, cross-filed with Senate Bill 565,
- 19 titled, Public Health Data Race and Ethnicity Information.
- 20 This bill requires the Board to collect racial and ethnic
- 21 composition of all individuals who hold a license or

1 certificate. It was enacted in Chapter 761 and 762. The Board

- 2 took no position.
- 3 House Bill 416, cross-filed with Senate Bill 204,
- 4 titled, Health Care Facilities Assisted Living Programs Memory
- 5 Care and Alzheimer's Disease Unit Regulations. This bill
- 6 requires MDH, or the Maryland Department of Health, to adopt
- 7 regulations that establish standards governing memory care and
- 8 Alzheimer's disease units in assisted living programs. These
- 9 standards include staff training requirements, staff pattern
- 10 requirements, and activity frequency for residents. It was
- 11 enacted in Chapters 479 and 480. The Board took no position.
- 12 House Bill 484, cross-filed with Senate Bill 111,
- 13 titled, Health Care Facilities Dialysis Treatment Services
- 14 Training, also known as the David Shelby Dialysis Parity Act.
- 15 This bill prohibits a health care facility from providing
- 16 peritoneal dialysis or hemodialysis treatment services unless
- 17 the individual performing the dialysis procedure has been
- 18 appropriately trained. It was enacted in Chapters 466 and 467.
- 19 The Board submitted a letter of support.
- 20 House Bill 758, cross-filed with Senate Bill 684,
- 21 titled, Maryland Licensure of Certified Midwives Act. This bill

- 1 establishes a new discipline of certified midwifery for the
- 2 Board to license and regulate. It requires the Board to issue a
- 3 license to practice certified midwifery to individuals who have
- 4 met certain requirements. It was enacted in Chapters 462 and
- 5 463. The Board has submitted a letter of support with
- 6 amendments.
- 7 House Bill 1040, cross-filed with Senate Bill 736,
- 8 titled, Health Occupations Pharmacists Administration of
- 9 Vaccinations. This bill authorizes a pharmacist to administer
- 10 vaccines to an adult or to an individual that is at least 3
- 11 years old but under the age of 18 years. This bill repeals the
- 12 requirements that individuals have a prescription in order for a
- 13 pharmacist to administer a vaccine to the individual. It was
- 14 enacted in Chapters 792 and 793. The Board submitted a letter
- 15 of support.
- Senate Bill 307, titled, Labor and Employment
- 17 Direct Care Workforce Innovation Program. This bill establishes
- 18 the Direct Care Workforce Innovation Program; The Program will
- 19 provide grants to entities interested in creating an extended
- 20 recruitment and expanding recruitment and retention strategies
- 21 to increase the numbers of direct care workers. It was enacted

- 1 in Chapter 699. The Board has submitted a letter of concern.
- 2 And finally, we have Senate Bill 744, titled, State
- 3 Board of Nursing Certified Nursing Assistant Advisor Committee
- 4 Membership and Meetings. This act adds additional language to
- 5 clarify the qualifications and duration of individuals serving
- 6 on the Committee. It requires the Committee to meet a certain
- 7 number of times, and requires the Board to increase the number
- 8 of alternates that serve on the Committee. It was enacted in
- 9 Chapter 465, and the Board provided oral testimony and support
- 10 of this bill.
- I would be happy to answer any questions that you
- 12 may have.
- MR. RAYMOND: Are there any questions from board
- 14 members for Iman?
- 15 (No questions posed)
