4 Jacqueline Hill. I am the designee in Mr. Gary Hicks'

5 absence. I will be presiding this morning.

6 We are going to start with the roll call of the

7 ones who are in the room, first, to my left.

9 CHAIR HILL: All right. So, do we have a

10 quorum?

11 MS. EVANS: Yes.

12 CHAIR HILL: All right. Updates, Ms. Evans?

13 MS. EVANS: Good morning, everyone.

14 ALL: Good morning.

15 MS. EVANS: As far as Updates, Lookup a License

16 is back. It was down for about a

17 day-and-a-half, but it went back up yesterday at 12:00.

18 I really don't have any further updates at this time, so

19 we can proceed.

20 Oh, I do have one question. I do have one

21 thing, Madame Chair, I would like to add to the Education

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1 section. I sent it to the Board members this morning.

2 It's concerning IELTS online. That's an English Language

3 Proficiency exam. So, if I can add 3 to Education.

4 CHAIR HILL: Okay.

5 MS. EVANS: That's it.

6 CHAIR HILL: I would like a motion to approve

7 the Consent Agenda.

8 MS. LYONS: So moved. Lyons.

9 MS. LECHLITER: Second. Lechlitter.

10 CHAIR HILL: It's been moved that the Consent

11 Agenda has been approved.

12 All in favor say, aye.

13 ALL: Aye.

14 CHAIR HILL: Those opposed, nay.

15 (No oppositions)

16 CHAIR HILL: Any abstentions?

17 (No abstentions)

18 CHAIR HILL: Okay. So, we will move onto

19 Education. Ms. Evans?

20 MS. EVANS: Everyone, I would like to first

21 speak on A, which is the USDOE update. So, we had

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1 completed our compliance report and we have submitted it.

2 We are going to NASIQI next Wednesday. We are on the

3 Consent Agenda. So, that's positive that our compliance

4 report has been approved and will have the final insert

5 next Wednesday.

6 We, also, on February 3rd, for our new renewal,

7 we submitted all the documentation – the five years of

8 the curriculum, right? So, we submitted out next one for

9 renewal on February 3rd, and we will await any comments

10 from USDOE concerning that matter.

11 The next item is ten schools, who three were on

12 the FBI list. And the other schools, we received an

13 email from Florida stating that these schools were found

14 not substantially equivalent in Florida. I am bringing

15 to the Board to find these schools not substantially

16 equivalent for Maryland. We will add them to our "not

17 approved" list. So, all the data you should have

18 received.

19 I need to do each one separately, correct?

20 MR. CONTI: Yes.

21 MS. ROBIN HILL: Where would that data be?

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1 MS. EVANS: You should have received an email
 2 from Joe. The FBI, you should have received already.
 3 MS. ROBIN HILL: I did not receive any.
 4 MS. EVANS: Okay. So, give me a second.
 5 (Whereupon, Ms. Evans resent emails with the
 6 data to the Board members.)
 7 MS. EVANS: So, all the data that was given to
 8 this Board from the federal agency was a list of schools
 9 that were in affidavits, so I sent that to you as well.
 10 And, I also sent it, email-wise, about the IELTS. So,
 11 you should have all three.
 12 CHAIR HILL: I don't have it.
 13 MS. EVANS: You didn't get it? Anyone else who
 14 has not received it?
 15 CHAIR HILL: Any Board members on the call who
 16 have not received it?
 17 MS. WESTERFIELD: I've received it.
 18 CHAIR HILL: Thank you.
 19 MS. EVANS: So, here are the schools from
 20 Florida.
 21 (Whereupon, there was cross-talk among members

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1 and staff concerning the emails that were resent.)
 2 MS. EVANS: Is everyone good?
 3 ALL: Yes.
 4 MS. EVANS: So, getting back to each of these
 5 schools, we will do each one individually.
 6 So, the first school is Carleen Health
 7 Institute of South Florida – West Palm Beach. We are
 8 requesting that this school be found not substantially
 9 equivalent to Maryland schools.
 10 CHAIR HILL: Any discussion?
 11 (No discussion posed)
 12 CHAIR HILL: I will entertain a motion for
 13 approval.
 14 MS. CASSIDY: So moved. Cassidy.
 15 MS. ROBIN HILL: Second. Dr. Robin Hill.
 16 CHAIR HILL: Cassidy and Dr. Robin Hill. All
 17 in favor say, aye.
 18 ALL: Aye.
 19 CHAIR HILL: Anybody opposed?
 20 (No oppositions)
 21 CHAIR HILL: The motion passed to approve

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1 Carleen Health Institute of West Palm Beach to not be a
 2 substantially equivalent school.
 3 MS. EVANS: The next school is Med Life
 4 Institute – Lauderdale Lakes. The request is to find
 5 that school not substantially equivalent to Maryland
 6 schools.
 7 Any questions?
 8 (No questions posed)
 9 CHAIR HILL: Okay. A motion for approval?
 10 MS. ROBIN HILL: So moved. Dr. Robin Hill.
 11 MS. WESTERFIELD: Second. Westerfield.
 12 CHAIR HILL: So, it's been moved by Dr. Robin
 13 Hill, and a second by Dr. Westerfield.
 14 All in favor say, aye.
 15 ALL: Aye.

 6 College in Broward County to not be a substantially
 7 equivalent school.
 8 MS. EVANS: The next school is Palm Beach
 9 School of Nursing – Palm Beach. The recommendation is to
 10 find that Palm Beach School of Nursing – Palm Beach is
 11 not substantially equivalent to Maryland Schools.
 12 CHAIR HILL: Any questions?
 13 (No questions posed)
 14 CHAIR HILL: I will entertain a motion.
 15 MS. CASSIDY: So moved. Cassidy.
 16 MS. ROBIN HILL: Second. Dr. Robin Hill.
 17 CHAIR HILL: All in favor?
 18 ALL: Aye.
 19 CHAIR HILL: Opposed?
 20 (No oppositions)
 21 CHAIR HILL: Abstained?

 2 CHAIR HILL: So, the motion passed that Palm
 3 Beach School of Nursing at Palm Beach is not a
 4 substantially equivalent school to Maryland.
 5 MS. EVANS: The last one is Sacred Heart
 6 International Institute – Broward County. The
 7 recommendation is to find that it is not substantially
 8 equivalent to Maryland schools.
 9 CHAIR HILL: Any questions?
 10 (No questions posed)
 11 CHAIR HILL: I will entertain a motion.
 12 MS. STEINBERG: So moved. Steinberg.
 13 MS. CASSIDY: Second. Cassidy.
 14 CHAIR HILL: All in favor?
 15 ALL: Aye.
 16 CHAIR HILL: Opposed?
 17 (No oppositions)
 18 CHAIR HILL: So, the motion passed that Sacred
 19 Heart International Institute at Broward County is not
 20 considered substantially equivalent to Maryland schools.
 21 MS. EVANS: Thank you. The next on my list is

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1 IELTS Online. That’s an English Language Proficiency
 2 exam. Currently, individuals will need to go in person,
 3 and I would like the Board to approve for this English
 4 Language Proficiency exam to be done online. From the
 5 first time we had this conversation, about three years
 6 ago, they have really improved the security piece of this
 7 online program. It doesn’t change anything as far as
 8 content as far as the paper to computer. It provides
 9 human and AI navigation, which is features such as
 10 multiple ID checks for identity authenticity. They have
 11 online proctors that are highly trained by IELTS to
 12 further reduces risks in the online testing. The
 13 platform enables the test taker to take all four sections
 14 of the test within the same integrated system. The
 15 online results will be on the same IELTS result service
 16 making it easier for organizations to review the scores.
 17 And online users will have live face-to-face speaking
 18 tests with an examiner to ensure academic integrity and
 19 reduce the likelihood of malpractice and contract
 20 cheating.
 21 So, I would like to recommend that the Board

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1 allows anyone that needs to take the English Language
 2 Proficiency exam to be able to take IELTS not only on
 3 paper but online as well.
 4 Are there any questions concerning what I’ve
 5 just stated that I can clarify?
 6 CHAIR HILL: So, before it was just in person,
 7 and now you want to add online?
 8 MS. EVANS: Yes. They’ve really done a great
 9 job with all the proctoring. It is much better than it
 10 was three years ago.
 11 CHAIR HILL: Okay. Would anyone like to make a
 12 motion to offer the IELTS exam online as well as in
 13 person?
 14 MS. ROBIN HILL: So moved. Dr. Robin Hill.
 15 MS. LECHLITER: Second. Lechliter.
 16 CHAIR HILL: All in favor?
 17 ALL: Aye.
 18 CHAIR HILL: Anybody opposed?
 19 (No oppositions)
 20 CHAIR HILL: Abstentions?
 21 (No abstentions)

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1 CHAIR HILL: The motion passed. So, next items
 2 on the agenda, Items 5 and 6, there are no reports. So,
 3 we are going to move onto the Legislative Affairs with
 4 Iman.
 5 Iman, are you on the line?
 6 MS. FARID: Yes, I am here. Can you hear me?
 7 CHAIR HILL: Yes, loud and clear. Thank you.
 8 MS. FARID: Terrific. Good morning, everyone,
 9 and happy Wednesday. We have two items to discuss this
 10 morning. I will start with Item 7A. This memorandum
 11 provides a list of bills assigned to the Board for review
 12 from the week of January 30, 2023 through the week of
 13 February 22, 2023.
 14 The first bill we have is House Bill 196,
 15 cross-filed with Senate Bill 78, titled, Health
 16 Occupations – Service Members, Veterans, and Military
 17 Spouses – Temporary Licensure, Certification,
 18 Registration, and Permitting.
 19 This bill requires health occupations boards to
 20 issue and expedited temporary license, certificate, or
 21 permit to a service member, veteran, or military spouse

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1 who meets certain requirements; requires each health
 2 board to include a check-off box prominently on an
 3 application form; and finally, this bill requires the
 4 Maryland Department of Health to publish information on
 5 its website.
 6 The Board submitted a Letter of Information
 7 with Amendments.
 8 House Bill 266 – Public and Nonpublic Schools –
 9 Bronchodilator and Epinephrine Availability and Use –
 10 Policies. This bill requires each county board of
 11 education and authorizes non-public schools to establish
 12 a policy to obtain, administer, and train school nurses
 13 and other school personnel to administer in emergency
 14 situations bronchodilators to a student who is determined
 15 to have asthma and is experiencing
 16 asthma– related symptoms or is perceived to be in
 17 respiratory distress; this bill also requires each county
 18 board to update their policies to require school nurse
 19 and other school personnel to complete training before
 20 they are authorized to administer
 21 auto–injectable epinephrine to a student; and requires

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1 the State Department of Education to develop training for
 2 School personnel to identify symptoms of anaphylaxis,
 3 asthma, or respiratory distress.
 4 The Board submitted a Letter of Opposition.
 5 House Bill 278, cross-filed with Senate Bill
 6 213: Health Occupations – Clinical Nurse Specialists –
 7 Prescribing. This bill alters the definition of
 8 “clinical nurse specialist” and “practice as a clinical
 9 nurse specialist” for the purpose of authorizing clinical
 10 nurse specialists to prescribe drugs and durable medical
 11 equipment; this bill also alters the definition of
 12 “authorized prescriber” for the purposes of the Maryland
 13 Pharmacy Act; and authorizes a licensed physician to
 14 personally prepare and dispense a prescription written by
 15 a clinical nurse specialist.
 16 The Board submitted a Letter of Support with
 17 Amendments.
 18 House Bill 352, cross-filed with Senate Bill
 19 376: Health Occupations – Licensed Direct Entry Midwives
 20 – Previous Cesarean Section. This bill allows a licensed
 21 direct entry midwife to assume or take responsibility for

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1 a client who had a previous cesarean section; alters the
 2 required contents of a certain informed consent
 3 agreement; and requires the Board of Nursing, in
 4 consultation with certain stakeholders, to develop a
 5 transport protocol for clients who had a previous
 6 cesarean section.
 7 The Board submitted a Letter of Support with
 8 Amendments.
 9 House Bill 453, cross-filed with Senate Bill
 10 375: State Board of Physicians – Inactive and Emeritus
 11 Status. This bill authorizes the Board of Physicians to
 12 place a licensee on emeritus status; requires the Board
 13 to reinstate the license of an individual who is on
 14 inactive or emeritus status; exempts licensees who are on
 15 inactive or emeritus status from continuing medical
 16 education requirements; repeals the requirement that the
 17 Board of Physicians issue a license to an individual who
 18 is on inactive status; prohibits licensees who are on
 19 inactive or emeritus status from practicing, attempting,
 20 offering to practice, medicine, or delegate medical acts;
 21 and finally, it exempts licensees who are on emeritus

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 26</p> <p>1 status from the prohibition on persons using certain 2 words or terms with the intent to represent that the 3 person practices medicine. 4 The Board submitted No Position. 5 House Bill 454, cross-filed with Senate Bill 6 187: Health Occupations – Licenses, Certificates, and 7 Registrations – Immigrants. This bill prohibits a health 8 occupations board from denying a license or certificate 9 to an immigrant, if the individual meets certain 10 requirements; and requires each applicant to disclose the 11 social security number or individual taxpayer 12 identification number. 13 The Board submitted a Joint Letter of Support 14 with Amendments. 15 House Bill 475, cross-filed with Senate Bill 16 439: Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) Compact. 17 This bill enrolls the State of Maryland into the Advanced 18 Practice Registered Nurse Compact; establishes criteria 19 for participating states; authorizes an APRN to practice 20 in a party state under certain scope of practice rules; 21 establishes the Interstate Commission of APRN Compact</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 28</p> <p>1 provides a personal use pharmaceutical disposal system to 2 the ultimate user at no cost; and authorizes the 3 Department of Health to provide personal use 4 pharmaceutical disposal systems to certain pharmacies. 5 The Board took No Position. 6 House Bill 611: State Board of Nursing – 7 Sunset Extension, Licensure Exceptions, and Board 8 Operations and Membership. This bill extends to a 9 certain date the termination provisions relating to the 10 statutory and regulatory authority of the State Board of 11 Nursing; alters the exceptions to the registered nursing 12 and licensed practical nursing licensure requirements; 13 provides that the Secretary of Health, for a certain 14 period of time, has authority over the infrastructure 15 operations of the Board; prohibits the Board of Nursing 16 Fund from being used to pay for infrastructure operations 17 for a certain period of time; requires the Board to hire 18 a certain consultant to conduct an independent 19 evaluation; and requires that the terms of certain 20 members of the Board end on certain dates. 21 The Board’s first meeting, the Board submitted</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 27</p> <p>1 Administrators; requires the Compact Administrator of the 2 state to make certain recommendations on the formation of 3 the Commission; and provide for the amendment of and 4 withdrawal of from the Compact. 5 The Board submitted a Letter of Support. 6 House Bill 532, cross-filed with Senate Bill 7 370: Certified Nursing Assistants – Licensing 8 Requirements and Administrative Updates. This bill 9 requires a certified nursing assistant to complete an 10 approved nursing assistant training program meeting 11 certain requirements; this bill also requires the State 12 Board of Nursing to provide certain notifications to 13 geriatric nursing assistants and nursing homes regarding 14 certain provisions of the NPA; and requires the Board to 15 update the title of geriatric nursing assistants on the 16 renewal of a license. 17 The Board submitted a Letter of Support with 18 Amendments. 19 House Bill 570: Public Health – Prescription 20 Opioids – Deactivation System.
